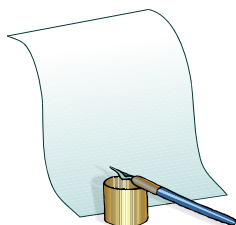

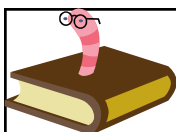

Parish Ministry Opportunities

What does it mean to be a Confirmation Mentor? Holy Confirmation requires students to ask some hard questions – of themselves, of God, and of others. *What does it mean to be a person of faith? Why this religion? Why this denomination? Why this church? Do I have to believe everything the church says to be a member?* These are difficult questions to ask, and even more difficult questions to answer. That is why every confirmand is paired with a mentor: an adult parishioner who will walk the confirmation journey with their student. The mentor is not expected to have all the answers, rather, the courage to say, "I don't know – but we'll figure it out - together."

The mentor will play an important role in the life of the confirmand. For that reason we have some criterion by which we choose mentors for the students. The mentor is someone who will grow and learn *with* their student – spiritually, emotionally, and mentally. Mentors must be active members who are involved in, and committed to, the life of the church.

The purpose of the mentoring process is for both the adult and the student to create a *new* relationship within the church community. Many parishioners have served as confirmation mentors over the past eight years and have found it exciting and spiritually fulfilling. If you are interested in this dynamic ministry with our youth this year, please speak with Fr. Richard, Mother Ann or call the parish office for further information. An orientation for confirmation mentors outlining the Confirmation program will be held soon.

Stewardship Thought

“Now a man came up to Jesus and asked, ‘Teacher, what good thing must I do to get eternal life?’ ‘Why do you ask me about what is good?’ Jesus replied. ‘There is only one good. If you want to enter life, obey the commandments ‘All of these I have kept,’ the young man said. ‘What do I still lack?’ Jesus answered, ‘If you want to be perfect, go, sell your possessions and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow Me.’ When the young man heard this, he went away sad, because he had great wealth.”

The confident young man probably shouldn't have asked what it was he was lacking. For the Savior hit him with a challenge and an invitation that no one in his right mind would have put forward. “Go sell everything you have, give the proceeds to the poor, and come and follow Me.”

Herein lies one of the great Christian enigmas. Does Christ really want any person to have (much less enjoy) wealth, or not? Why does Jesus give this confrontational command when others in the Biblical literature (both Old and New Testaments) appear free to have many possessions?

The only conceivable answer is this: Jesus, looking into this man's heart, knew that his wealth owned him. That he defined himself with his money and his status. Or to use religious language: His money and his lifestyle was his god, and he worshipped it all.

It was this abnormal attachment that stood between him and the eternal life he asked Jesus about. Not a lot difference from the attachment Abraham apparently felt to his only son, Isaac. In both cases, men were challenged to lay their “gods” on the altar. One man, his son; the other, his money.

“When the young man went away, he felt sad because he had great wealth.” One wonders, how long did this young man live with that sadness? A few days? Months? A lifetime? A laser beam of conviction had been shot into his soul, and his real god had been exposed.

What if the young man had said to Jesus: “I'll do it. I'll meet you here tomorrow after I've divested myself of everything.” Can you imagine Jesus saying, as heaven had answered Abraham many years before, “Stop, now I know that you love me.”?

Some think that the young man actually thought this challenge through and did what Jesus asked. I'm doubtful. If only that I suspect Matthew would have told us

the end of the story had that happened.

The would-be generous giver must read this story many, many times. Memorizing it would not hurt. It speaks to the chief temptation any successful or wealthy person has: When does all of this become a god to me? And what if Jesus were to put the challenge to me?

Treasurer's Report

It's the third week of Advent, with Christmas fast approaching. Linda is putting ribbon on the tree as I write this final article of 2011. The 2012 budget has been approved by the Budget Committee and will be presented to the Vestry on December 21. With a lot of effort, along with some great fine tuning by committee members, the bottom line is flat—in fact very slightly down—for the second year running.

As is always the case, we are in a situation similar to many school boards: formulating a spending budget without a complete picture of the income side. Unsubmitted Estimates of Giving are the equivalent of state aid. Just like school boards get state aid information months after the budget vote, we don't have solid Estimate of Giving numbers until late January or February. But that is the nature of a church budget, and we do the very best we can to preserve our program.

After a very poor third quarter, our investments did well in October, up over \$200,000. November saw a net decline, although the final week saw recovery of the markets. Hopefully we will see a strong end to a year marked by volatility. Budgets are estimates, not written in stone. Depending on final Estimate of Giving figures and the performance of our endowment, adjustments can be made as we proceed into 2012. On a positive note, individual average Estimates of Giving are up. As those final cards come in, hopefully we will see a bridging of the gap. We thank those who have submitted their cards for their generosity. If you have not yet submitted your card, please do so as soon as possible.

Gift Cards

This has been a disappointing year for gift card sales. In 2010 we cleared \$2,155 in profits. As of early December, the 2011 figure has dropped to only \$430. Part of the reason for this is that we have lost volunteers to sell the cards at coffee hour. Some volunteers had been helping out for about five years and certainly deserve a sabbatical! Eileen Hazel has just volunteered to help out and we thank her for her future service. This is a ministry that involves a commitment of about 30 minutes, once or twice a month. Can you help?

More importantly, can you help by purchasing the cards? If you do your grocery shopping at King Kullen or Stop & Shop, it's a win-win situation. Purchasing cards is an even exchange of cash for cards. The supermarkets sell the cards to us for 95% of their value, so we clear 5% on each sale. The potential numbers are almost too good to be true. If 200 families spent \$100 per week (a low number for my family!) we would sell \$1,040,000 in cards

per year, clearing a \$52,000 profit! The real difficulty is establishing the habit of buying the cards religiously (pun intended). You can buy them at Sunday coffee hour (assuming volunteers) or at the office during the week. This could be a New Year's Resolution that could help our church immensely without any out of pocket costs to our parishioners. Please consider establishing this habit.

Similarly, we have established Caroline Church as an "Amazon Associate." If you are one of many who shop at Amazon.com, we have a search link on our web site that links you to the Amazon site. Using that link and then making your purchase costs you nothing but a couple of mouse clicks. We get several percentage points of that sale. The exact number varies depending on the nature of the purchase. The link is under "What's New," then "Fundraising for Caroline." Try it next time you shop on line. College students who buy their texts on line should also be aware of this link and use it at the beginning of each semester!

The Chemicals Around Us

Many baby boomers and their parents have witnessed technological advancements that change the way we live from the home computer to new cooking and cleaning products. However, these changes have come at a price including exposure to untested chemicals. Scientific evidence finds that toxic chemical exposures, especially prenatal and childhood, is associated with chronic health concerns such as obesity, heart disease, type II diabetes, Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases.

We can't ensure chemicals are really safe for the children in our lives without a protective chemical policy. Congress is considering reform of our chemical policy. Over 84,000 chemicals are registered for use, but only 200 have been fully tested for safety. This is unacceptable. If you are a grandparent or older adult you can help reform our national chemical policy and protect children's health, by writing to congress.

Dear Members of Congress,

As grandparents and aging adults from unique faith traditions, we share a strong calling to honor and protect God's Creation and all life on Earth. We are called to care for the next generation and we want to ensure that all children- including those in low-income households and children of color- inherit a better world.

We are greatly concerned about the rising rates of diseases such as cancer, Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, type II diabetes, and heart disease in the United States. These diseases are expected to double or triple by 2050 when today's children are adults. A number of these conditions are linked to or caused from exposures to toxic chemicals in the products we use in our homes and congregations. Many of us from the baby boomer generation have been exposed to particularly toxic chemicals throughout our lifetime, such as DDT, and we want to ensure a better life for our children and our children's children. We urge you to consider the health of all people today, future generations, and the sacredness of all life on Earth by passing urgently needed chemical policy reform that includes:

Making sure chemicals are safe before they end up in the products we all use and ultimately migrate into our bodies and the environment.

Swiftly removing the most dangerous chemicals, such as persistent bioaccumulative toxic (PBT) chemicals, such as DDT, when safer alternatives exist.

Find ways to reduce the disproportionate burden of toxic chemicals born by low-income communities and

communities of color, and in particular by all God's children.

In these ways we can improve the health of God's Creation, and ensure the world is a safe and healthy place for the future generations of God's children.

Harvest Dinner Butternut Squash Soup

So many of you raved about the soup at the Harvest Dinner that I thought you would enjoy having the recipe. Here is an approximation of that recipe – down from 10 squash to one! Please note that soup making is an art, not a science. If you like a particular flavor, add a pinch more. If you don't like something, start out with none of it, or at least with a small amount and experiment until you get the flavor where you like it. Enjoy!



Ingredients:

1 butternut squash – 2-3 pounds
¼ cup olive oil
1 cup onion – 2 medium onions
½ cup carrots – one large carrot
½ cup celery – two stalks
1 T garlic
1 T fresh thyme
½ t cumin
1 t salt
1 t pepper
1 qt chicken stock (you can also use vegetable stock)
1 cup heavy cream – at room temperature

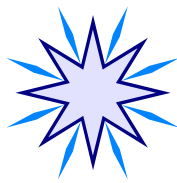
- ◆ Bake the squash whole at 350 until it's done - about an hour. Prick the skin before baking. The squash should be very soft when done and will peel easily – or scoop – into a large soup pot when done. Discard seeds and skin.
- ◆ Dice onions and garlic and sauté in olive oil in a large pan. When clear, add carrots and celery and continue to sauté until soft. Add 1 cup chicken (or vegetable) stock and simmer for 15-20 minutes.
- ◆ Add sautéed ingredients to soup pot with squash. Start heat at medium on stove.
- ◆ Add remainder of chicken (or vegetable) stock, thyme, cumin, salt and pepper. Stir frequently because the soup is thick. Bring to a boil. Adjust spices to your taste.
- ◆ Use an immersion blender to puree all ingredients. Alternately, transfer to a regular blender and puree until smooth. Be careful if using a regular blender - the ingredients are hot.
- ◆ If the soup seems too thick, add a small amount of water. Otherwise bring to a boil and then let simmer. It can be served now, but will thicken if allowed to simmer for a few hours. Stir frequently.
- ◆ Ten minutes before serving, turn off heat. Wisk in cream and serve.
- ◆ Garnish with fresh thyme, gorgonzola cheese (we did this at the Harvest Dinner), apples, or chopped almonds.
- ◆ Enjoy. This recipe should make hearty 8 servings.

E.C.W. Morning Branch Annual Christmas Fair - a HUGE Success

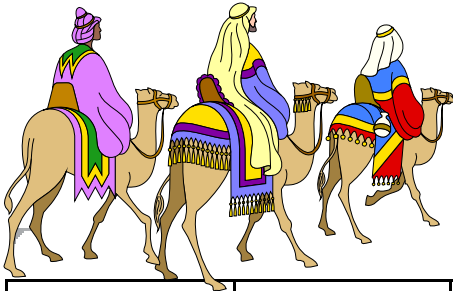

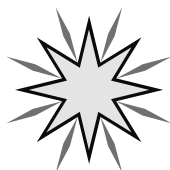
